- : success by chance and not by effort.
- → Wishing you the **Best of Luck!**
- 2) lucky / lnki/ (adjective)
- : Something good happens as of the result of luck.
- → You are lucky to have gotten a good deal.
- 3) **fortunate** /ˈfɔː(r)tʃənət/ (adjective)

:lucky as you have *more advantages* than others.

- → Not everyone is **as fortunate as** we are.
- → I am fortunate to have a supportive family.

People who buy	Application (Sentences)
prospect / prospekt/ a): a person who might be chosen	a) We will be interviewing 2 more prospects for the jobs / posts / positions.
b) a possible future customer	 b) Our financial analyst has contacted 10 prospects this morning. He will be showing them the financial prospectus in the meetings. → prospectus: a printed booklet giving details of a share offer for the benefit of investors.
2) buyer : someone who buys something	*buy to sell He is looking for a buyer for his house.
3) purchaser (more formal): someone who purchases or buys	*Purchase order or price *Purchasing power *Purchasing officer *Procurement /pro kjuo(r)mont/ buyer or purchaser The potential purchaser has not turned up yet.
4) acquirer : a person, company or entity that buy or obtain an asset.	→ turn up : arrive, be found Sam managed to <i>acquire</i> the piece of land at a good deal. He <i>acquired</i> the company in 2008.

5) customer : a person who buys goods or a	Sammy is our regular customer.
service	→ regular: doing something often, usual.
6) client (more formal)	Ariel is our client.
: a person who receives	Ariel has been our client for many years.
services.	Ariel has been our client since 2008.
*A person who has more professional and closer relationship with.	→ use "has been" in Present Perfect Tense to emphasise on the duration (for many years, since)
7) clientele / kli:pn tel/ : clients <i>collectively</i> *A collection or group of clients	He is a well-established agent who serves a loyal clientele.
	The well-established company has a growing clientele.
	→ well-established(adjective)
	: having a recognised position, especially for a long existence.

People who serve	Application (Sentences)
1) steward /ˈstjuːə(r)d/ (MALE) stewardess /ˌstjuːə(r)ˈdes/ (FEMALE)	The steward and stewardess were serving on the flight passengers.
2) concierge /ˈkɒnsiˌeə(r)ʒ/ : someone who help people in a hotel dealing with problems or providing information	The concierge in this hotel is very friendly and professional.
3) valet /'væleɪ/ or /'vælɪt/ : someone who works in a hotel or restaurant helping the customer to park the car	We reached there earlier and allowed the valet to get our car parked. The valet helped us to park the car.
